# Arabian jasmine

*Jasminum sambac* Also known as: **Mogra, Arabic jasmine, Pikake, Sacred jasmine**

This description is for **Arabian jasmine (*Jasminum sambac*)**:

A tender evergreen climber, *Jasminum sambac* is a celebrated member of the genus thanks to its tiny white blossoms that emerge at any time of the year, depending on growing conditions. Commonly called the Arabian jasmine, its blossoms are sometimes tinged pink deep within the sparse whorls of sword-shaped petals. Its dark or olive green foliage is comprised of oval to lance-shaped leaves that are usually crinkled. The Arabian jasmine is a perfect option for a garden trellis, but as a tender plant it grows best indoors. Grow in pots using loam-based compost and place in bright but filtered light. Water freely while growing but rarely in winter, and feed monthly.
