

drooping prickly pear

Opuntia vulgaris Also known as: **prickly pear, tuna Opuntia ficus-indica** Rating: 0.0 (0 votes)

This description is for drooping prickly pear (Opuntia vulgaris):

A popular cactus species, opuntia vulgaris is also known by the synonym, opuntia ficus-indica. It grows in flat, pear-shaped segments with long black spines growing from their surfaces, thus earning it the common name, the prickly pear. It flowers in early summer, with small yellow, red or white blossoms blooming from small, pineapple-like pods on its edges. These flowers eventually give way to purple edible succulent fruit, which are sweet to taste and usually ripe in late autumn. The prickly pear thrives in well-drained soil, in full sun but can be potted in cactus compost and grown under glass too. Water moderately when growing, and rarely in winter. Pruning is not required.
